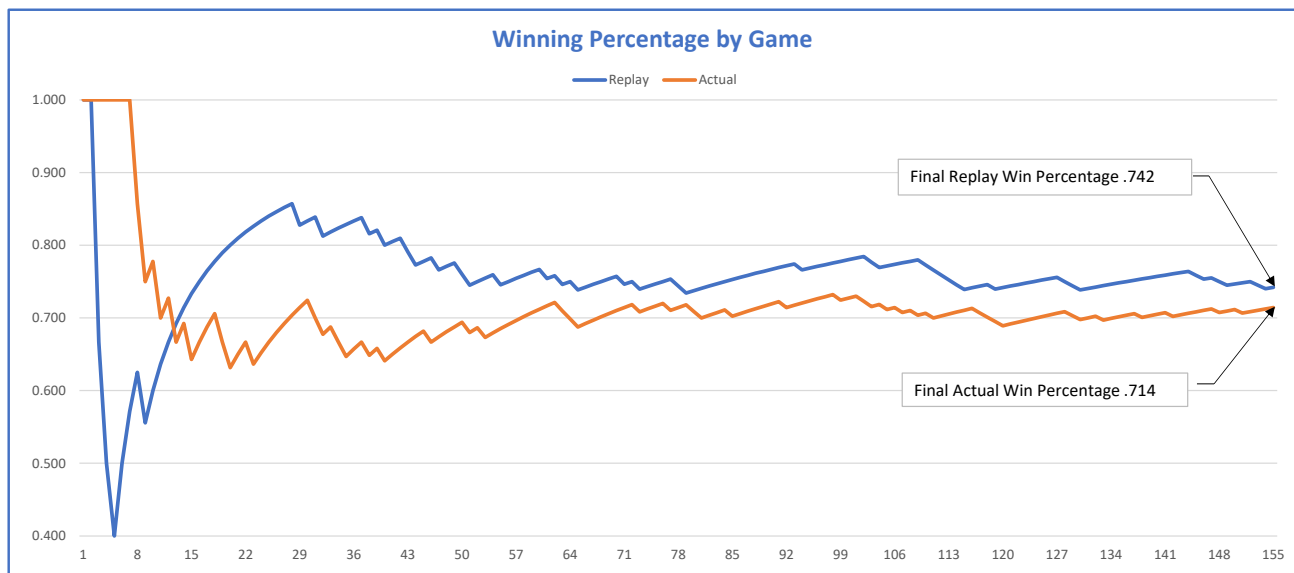
Season at a Glance

The Yankees began the season 5-4, then won the next nineteen (19) games straight! During the balance of the season, the Yanks were often in control by building an early lead. In fact, the Yankees scored 51% of the time in the first inning during the replay compared to 41% during actual play.

The Yankees won fifty-eight (58) games by five runs or more in the replay compared to forty-three (43) blow-out wins in actual play.

The Yankee team batting average was .310 in the replay versus .307 in actual play. Yankee replay ERA was 3.58 vs. 3.20 actual.

The Yankees excelled across the power categories. Yankee replay home runs were 5% more, triples 15% more and doubles 8% more. This factored into a .500 team slugging percentage in the replay versus .488 in actual play.



Game 1: Philadelphia (Grove) at New York (Hoyt)

The Athletics began with a 3-1 lead after the 1st inning with doubles from Al Simmons and Sammy Hale. For the Yanks, Earl Combs led off the first inning with a home run. Tony Lazzeri put the Yanks up for good with a three-run homer in the fifth inning and an Opening Day win.

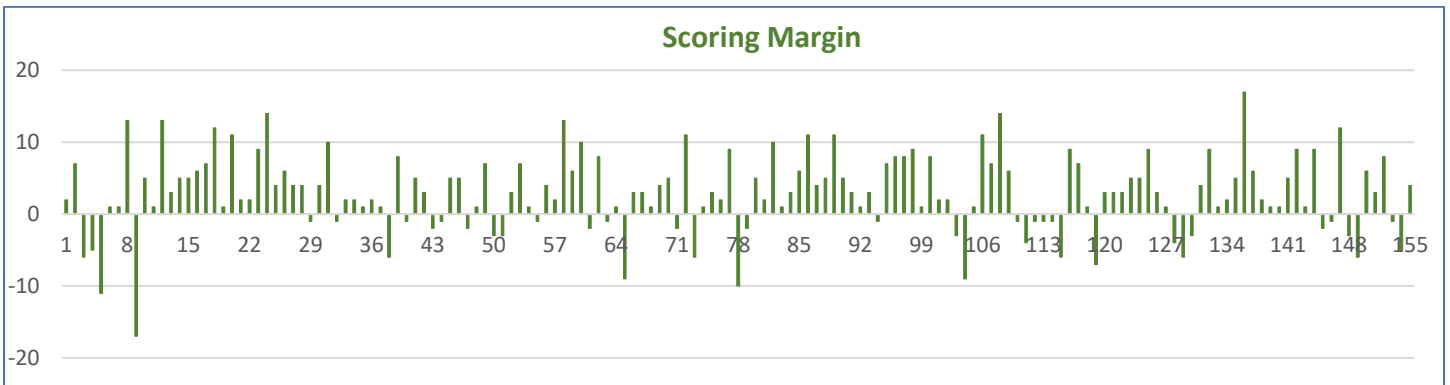

Overall, the Yankees were ultra-productive at the plate, outscoring (+70%), outhitting (+38%) and out-homer their opponents.

The Yanks hit 3.7 HR's for every opposing homer. The Yanks eclipsed the elusive one thousand runs in a season mark.

The Yanks struck out 56% more and walked 46% more than their opponents.

The Pythagorean statistic closely mirrored their replay winning percentage. The Pythagorean statistic is based on the difference in runs scored versus their opponents throughout the season.

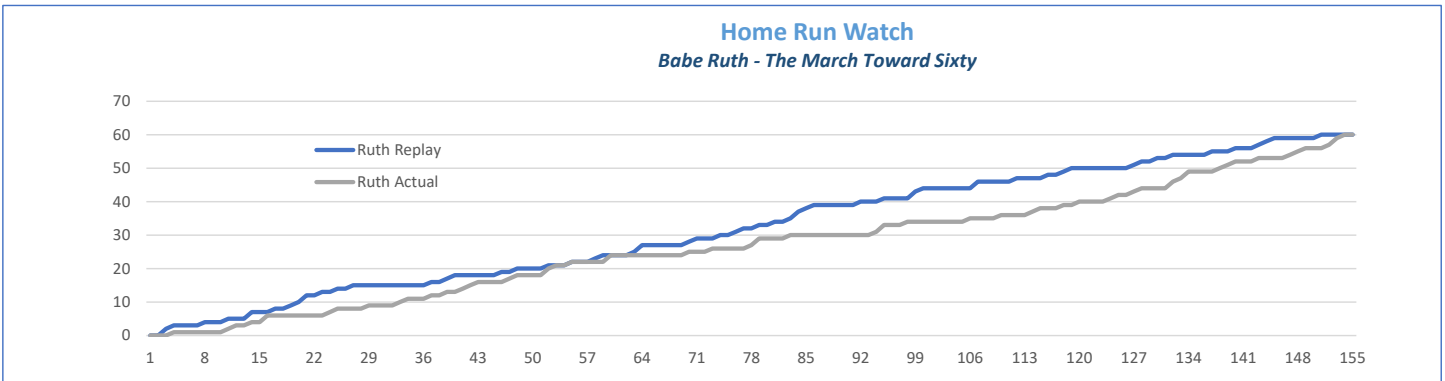

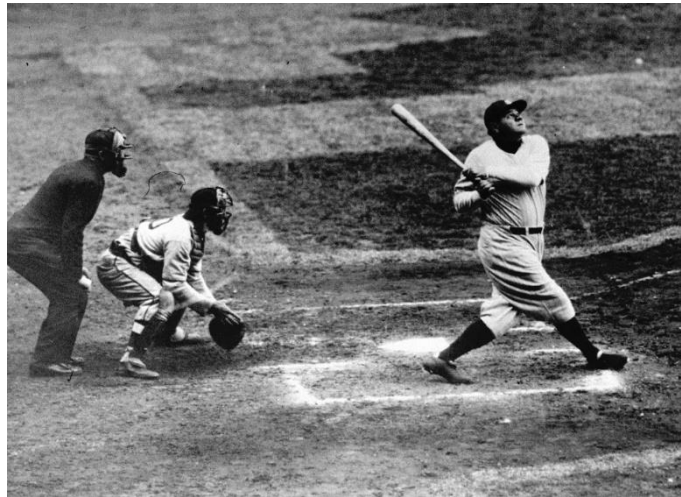

The Yankees battled the Pittsburgh Pirates and won the World Series in seven games, 4-3. In actual play, the Yankees swept the Pirates 4-0.

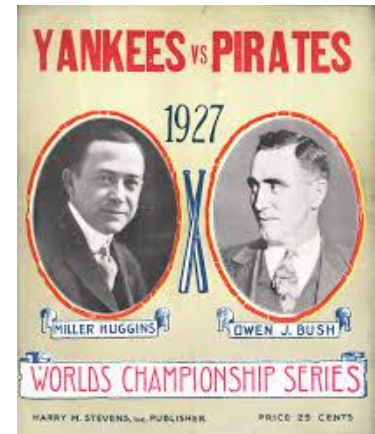
The Yankees only batted .249 in the series versus .285 for the Pirates, but clutch hitting made the difference.

Replay Notes

All games were played with cards and dice. Score was kept on paper and statistics were compiled via Excel.

Starting lineups were derived from Baseball-reference.com.

Plate appearances for hitters and innings pitched for pitchers were monitored throughout the season to best reflect reality.

The sacrifice hit was used extensively to reflect the Yankees 204 sacrifice hits in actual play. For comparison, the 1961 Yankees posted 102 (50% less) sacrifice hits. The double play was not included in 1927 statistics, so it was not accounted for in the batting statistics.

There were very few dedicated relief pitchers in 1927. It was common for most all pitchers to start and relieve.

It was amazing how many triples were hit in 1927. The Yankees hit 118 triples in the replay versus 103 in actual play. For comparison, the 1961 Yankees hit 40 triples (2/3 less).

The 1927 Yankee hurlers posted 82 complete games (53%) in actual play. In the replay, the starters completed 60 (39%) games.

Waite Hoyt and Wilcy Moore were the only two pitchers graded A or better in the entire American League.
